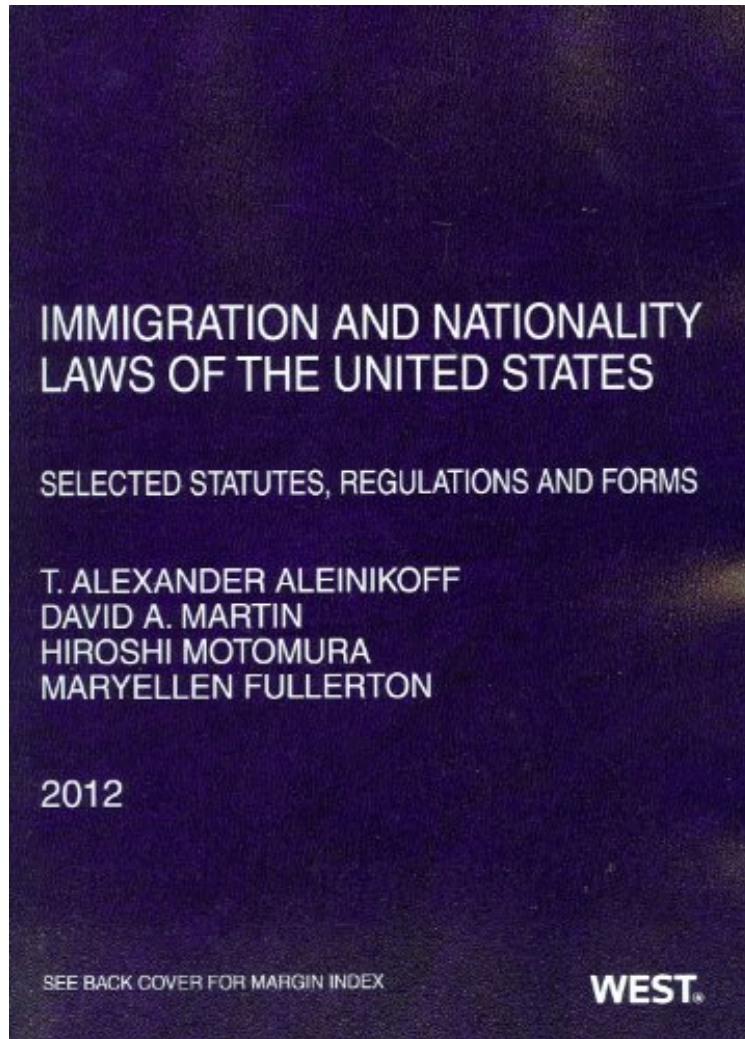

relevant excerpts from the CFR, treaties, and examples of state laws. For the practitioner, it also has many of the forms that are used for visa applications as well as those used for removal orders (so useful for both government immigration attorneys and private attorneys representing aliens). The reason for so few stars: the INA is full of cross-references, and I would have loved if the editors added page numbers for them. I realize that would be a ton of editorial work, but it would also save a ton of time. Second, the page headers for reference are also too general, they only go to the first subsection. INA 101(a), for example, is 24 pages long and has 52 sub-sub sections. But across the top of all those pages the most detail you get is 101(a). It causes a lot more flipping back and forth to orient yourself than necessary. The INA might be best utilized online, but then you can't make margin notes (necessary, given all the internal cross references) or see the section titles as easily. Finally, I can't give this book any more stars because it is expensive and about to become obsolete. If you absolutely need it in the next 6-8 months, try to find a used one or make do with an online version. Immigration reform seems inevitable (thank goodness), and this whole book will, in all likelihood, be useless.
