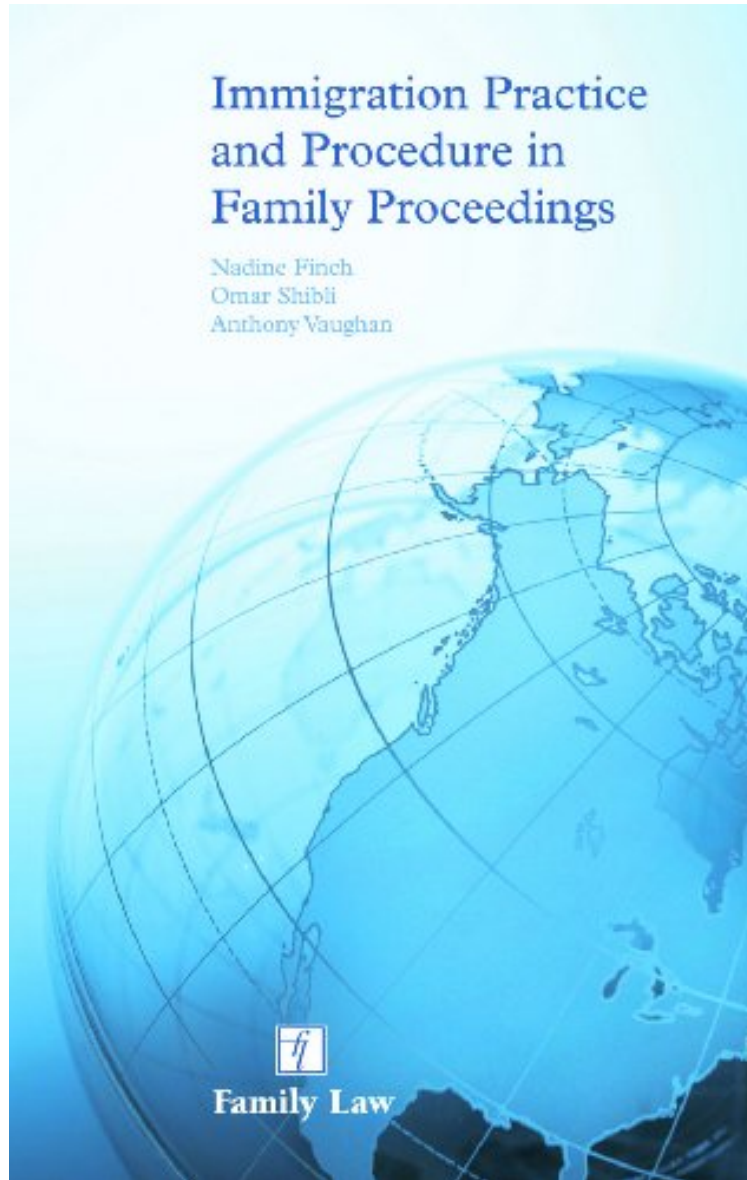

This new work of reference from Jordans, published as part of its distinguished Family Law series, offers a succinct and practical approach to this often sensitive subject and is therefore much needed and certainly timely. Speaking of complexity, the first two chapters tackle head on the complexities of immigration law as well as first principles, whilst Chapter three deals with 'the interface between immigration and family law' - which does give the often beleaguered family lawyer an immediately accessible frame of reference. These and the following eleven chapters deal in a straightforward, logical and manageable fashion with the full spectrum of immigration issues, including, for example, the rights of children, (focusing on the 'best interests' principle), entry clearance, leave to remain, removal, deportation and family reunion under the immigration rules. Chapters nine to fourteen cover many of the areas pertaining to rights, protections and penalties, including of course, human rights, with reference in particular to the Articles 2,3,5, and 8. Especially topical and noteworthy is Chapter 11 on human trafficking, while the chapter following deals with detention and bail, with additional reference to Article 5. The final two chapters provide guidance on financial, residence and employment matters. If you are involved professionally in family law issues, that involve immigration, either as a family lawyer, or possibly within a local authority, or as an immigration adjudicator, this compact volume in handy paperback format is well-nigh indispensable whether you are a new or an experienced practitioner. And - slender volume though it is -- this book is nonetheless a treasure for researchers, containing all the relevant tables of cases, statutes, statutory instruments, EC legislation and international materials, as well as the useful glossary and index. Also note the appendix which contains key statutory provisions, regulations and further guidance. For more general as well as detailed guidance on family proceedings check out another Jordans Family Law title: 'Advocacy in Family Proceedings' by David Bedingfield. Published as of 2013, both volumes are available as ebooks.

In the UK, there is an increasing trend encountered in family law - particularly in public law children proceedings - in which immigration issues assume importance and require clarification. This book concentrates on UK immigration procedures, law, and rules relevant to family proceedings, and it includes coverage of key topics, such as: the interface between family and immigration law * entry clearance * leave to remain in the UK * removal and deportation * family reunion under the immigration rules * human rights * asylum * human trafficking * detention and bail * rights to reside as an EU and EEA national. The Appendix contains key statutory provisions, regulations, and guidance.
